Aims of the session:

- To present and outline the upcoming FARNET guide on 'nurturing quality projects in fisheries areas.'

- The first of two FARNET guides in 2021.
- New structure: Each chapter focuses on individual FLAGs covering the following themes:
 - Healthy ecosystems
 - Sustainable local food systems
 - Developing business opportunities
 - Strengthening social capital and local governance





- Each chapter focuses on a series of sub-themes and will demonstrate how these themes are connected through quality projects.
- For example, the Sustainable local food systems chapter covers:
 - Sustainable production practices
 - Quality foods
 - Consumer awareness
 - Short supply chains

Why now?

- As we transition to the next period of fisheries CLLD, the COVID-19 pandemic has demonstrated the importance of **building local communities and economies that are resilient to short-term shocks and long-term changes.**
 - This will mean 'thinking out of the box.' to find new, innovative ways of addressing emerging local needs as well as those persistent needs that top-down policy responses have not been able to solve.
 - 'One size doesn't fit all.' FLAGs must **focus their efforts** and identify and support the best projects for their community's specific needs; projects with quality.



• By 'quality local projects,' we are referring to projects that make a real difference to an area and its local community members.



- Good local projects should:
 - Respond to a real need at local level
 - Including specific groups and/or individuals
 - They should be inclusive and have an impact on the area as a whole



- Good local projects should:
 - Build on local resources
 - Including an area's natural resources
 - But also, its human resources and their capacities



- Good local projects should:
 - Bring about change
 - To the local economy
 - To the environment
 - To the capacities and abilities of the local community
 - To the well-being and self-fulfilment of community members



- Good local projects should:
 - Contribute to long-term improvements
 - Not only be a short-term fix
 - Have longevity and create sustainable positive change
 - Be innovative and develop new ways of thinking




- Good local projects should:
 - Offer value for money
 - Strong justification for selection
 - Justifying the investment of public money
 - Have a broad impact



- Good local projects should:
 - Complement other local projects
 - Building synergies is important
 - Cooperation between projects
 - Feed into wider objectives and bigger vision for the area
 - Develop new opportunities and ideas
